


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The intention of this booklet is to offer the young child a happy and simple intro-

duction to embroidery.

Since the illustrations are self-explanatory and the designs easily reproduced on looselywoven fabrics, no printed instructions require to be followed.

Only the formations of very simple stitches

are shown thus:-

Pages 1-4-Variations of Running Stitch.

5—Cross Stitch.

6-Herring Bone Stitch.

Inside Back | Blank page for child's own

Cover designs.

The child achieves complete and unaided selfexpression by bringing the needle and thread through the material at the correct places to reproduce the illustration. This simple method avoids the preparation—by parent or teacher—of drawings and the use of transfers, and permits the child to work on his or her own initiative.

Certain colour combinations are illustrated here, but the specimens can be worked in a wide range of colours according to

individual tastes.


