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ABBREVIATIONS:—K. = Knit plain; P. = Purl; tog. = together; wl. fwd. = wool forward; p.s.s.o. = pass slip stitch over; w.o.n. = wool over needle; w.r.n. = wool round needle; t.b.l. = through the back of the loops; ch. = chain; tr. = treble; s.c. = single crochet; d.c. = double crochet; l.tr. = long treble (wool over hook twice); sl. st. = slip stitch; sp. = space.

IMPORTANT!

The correct size of any of the garments illustrated in this Book will only be obtained by USING THE WOOL RECOMMENDED IN THE RECIPE AND KNITTING AT THE CORRECT TENSION. To ensure this, use the wool and needles specified, and knit a small piece of fabric in the given pattern. If knitted correctly, the number of stitches to the inch in width should correspond with the tension given.

¶ When the instructions read, "Cast off 2 stitches, K.2" (or similar stitches), the stitch on the right-hand needle, after casting off, is counted as one stitch.

CUSHION (or RUG not illustrated)—"Fair Days" Design.

MATERIALS:—

PATON'S "ZINNIA" Knitting Wool.

A Rug may be made from these squares, and the quantities increased proportionately.

Orange (shade 556)	5 ozs.
Green (shade 4381)	5 ozs.
Beige (shade 509)	3 ozs.
Maize (shade 2245)	1 oz.
A No. 9 "Inox" Crochet Hook. A Cushion Pad.	

MEASUREMENTS:— 20 ins. x 20 ins.

ABBREVIATIONS:— See page 3.

TENSION:—

To get these measurements it is absolutely necessary to work at a tension to produce trebles 2 rows to an inch in height and 4 trebles to an inch in width.

To join in a new colour—when the last treble of round of old colour has been worked, take the colour to be used and draw a loop through the top of 3 ch. of previous

row and through loop on the hook—continue with the next round.

FIRST SECTION.—Using the Beige Wool, make 4 ch., join into ring with s.c.

1st round.—3 ch., 12 tr. into ring, join with s.c. into top of 3 ch.

2nd round.—3 ch. loosely, 1 tr. on 1 tr., * 2 tr. on 1 tr., repeat from * ten times, join with s.c. into top of 3 ch. Break off the Beige Wool. Join in the Maize.

3rd round.—3 ch. loosely, 4 tr. on 4 tr., * 5 tr. on next tr., 5 tr. on 5 tr., repeat from * twice, 5 tr. on next tr., join with s.c. into top of 3 ch.

4th round.—3 ch. loosely, * 1 tr. on 1 tr. to corner tr., 5 tr. on corner tr., repeat from * three times, 1 tr. on 1 tr. to the end of the round, join with s.c. into top of 3 ch. Repeat the 4th round, working in the stripes as follows:— 2 rounds in Green, 2 in Orange and 2 in Beige. Fasten off.

Work seven more Sections, 3 in stripes, 2 in Green, and 2 in Orange.

TO MAKE UP THE CUSHION.—With a slightly damp cloth and warm iron, press lightly. Place one striped and one Green section with the wrong sides of the work together, and join with a row of d.c. in Orange. Join a striped and Orange section in the same manner. Place the two strips together with a plain section opposite a striped one and join with a row of d.c. in Orange. Assemble the other four sections in the same manner. Place the two squares with the wrong sides together, placing a plain section opposite a striped section and using the Green Wool join by working d.c. through the double fabric along three and a half sides of the square (working 3 d.c. in each corner). Insert a cushion pad and continue working the d.c. through the double fabric along the other half of the last side.
