

# WRAP-A-BYE BABY AFGHAN

Cute white animals on a baby blue background, make the Wrap-A-Bye an enchanting afghan. Your little man (or woman) will be proud as punch of his pedigreed pets.

# **EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS**

1 4" Weave-It

10 1 oz. balls or 4-2 oz. skeins of Baby Blue 4-fold Germantown wool.

2 1 oz. balls of White 4-fold Germantown wool.

Bone crochet hook size 2 or 3.

First weave 99 blue squares, sew together in strips of 11 in a row, making 9 strips wide.


With white yarn work cross-stitch design following

diagram.


Edge: Join white in one corner, ch 7, catch back in 3rd st from hook for picot, ch 1, 1 d c in same st with the ch 7, \* ch 2, 1 s c in next scallop of square, ch 2, 1 d c in next scallop, ch 4, catch back in 3rd st for picot, ch 1, 1 d c in same scallop. Repeat from \* around. Fasten off neatly.

Press afghan on wrong side, with hot iron and wet

cloth.



Dots on small diagram mark the position for each cross-stitch design.





# HUSH-A-BYE SET





This dainty, unusual set—a gay, yellow and white afghan plus a white Gilgora sweater and bonnet—will delight the daintiest taste. The pointed edge of the afghan adds extra interest and a little ribbon adds the finishing touches to the bonnet and sweater.

# **EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS**

- 1 4" Weave-It
- 1 2" Weave-It
- 3 1 oz. skeins Botany Gilgora in white
- 2 yds. ribbon
- 1 bone crochet hook size 2 and 4 for afghan edge
- 2 2 oz. skeins white Germantown Botany
- 4 2 oz. skeins yellow Germantown Botany

Afghan: Weave 63 4" squares in yellow and 160 Jr. squares in yellow — 160 Jr. squares in white in Fancy Weave (see next page). Sew afghan together as shown in diagram. Start at one corner and sew either across or up and down, but do each row separately. Then join the rows.


Edge: Fasten the white yarn in one corner with a slip stitch. Make a picot in this stitch by chain 4, and

fasten with a slip stitch \* 3 single crochet between each next 3 loops, picot. Repeat around from \*.

Press well on wrong side with damp cloth and hot iron.

Jacket: Weave 24 4" squares and 37 Jr. squares in fancy weave. (See page 28.) Assemble as shown in diagram. Gather fronts and back on to yoke. Fold back Jr. Squares at neck as indicated by dotted lines, and tack on inside of jacket. Starting at point A at neck, make 1 double crochet, chain 2, 1 double crochet around next to form beading for ribbon tie. Sew cuffs on to sleeves. (Gather end of sleeve before sewing cuff on.) Sew in sleeves starting at points indicated by check marks. Press with damp cloth and run ribbon through beading.

Bonnet: Assemble as shown in diagram, matching B to B and sewing C to points D and D and sewing into E. Gather the 15 Jr. squares by running a piece of yarn through the center and gathering until it is



right size to fit around the face of the bonnet. Single crochet in each loop across the front of bonnet and single crochet in middle of scallop (1 stitch) across bottom edge to make fit head. Repeat for 3 rows all way around. Sew on ruffle across front. Sew on ribbon for ties.



# SNOW WHITE BABY BLANKET



You'll search far and wide to find as delightful a baby blanket as this. Woven in the exquisite Hour Glass Weave of pure white Germantown, it's a dreamy, yet durable and warm covering.

### **EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS**

1 4" Weave-It

4 2 oz. skeins White Botany Germantown

1 crochet hook (bone) size 4

First, weave 99 squares in Hour Glass Design, (see page 28). Sew together as shown in diagram, making the blanket 9 squares wide and 11 squares long.

Edge: Fasten in a corner with slip stitch, single crochet in each loop around the blanket. Make 2 together on all corners. Fasten with slip stitch.

2nd row: \* skip two stitches, work 6 treble crochets in next space, skip 2 stitches, 1 single crochet in next stitch, repeat from \* around blanket. Fasten off.

Press on wrong side with damp cloth, and hot iron.



# DRESS UP CARRIAGE ROBE

On those gay occasions when you and your bundle of fluff are on parade, you'll cherish this darling robe. In carriage or crib, it adds a touch of quality and luxury to baby's surroundings.

# **EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS**

1 4" Weave-It

4 2 oz. skeins Botany Germantown in Baby Pink

1 small skein each leaf green, light blue, medium blue, light rose, medium rose and light yellow tapestry yarn

1 crochet hook size 4, bone


Weave 99 squares and sew together, in three strips 3 x 9 (to make it easier to do the cross-stitching). Cross-stitch the motif, in each strip as per guide and then sew strips together.


(1) — small rose, (2) — smallest rose spray, (3) — rose spray.

Edge: Fasten yarn in a corner with slip stitch, chain 2 single crochet in middle 2 scallops.

\* chain 2 single crochet in middle of next scallop. Repeat all way around afghan. Next row: Fasten with slip stitch in a corner. Chain 1, skip a space of chain 2 of 1st row and \* 1 double crochet. Picot (chain 4 in picot) 2 double crochets, picot, 2 double crochets, picot, 1 double crochet all in next space of chain 2. Chain 1, repeat from \* all way around carriage cover. Fasten off.


Press well on wrong side with damp cloth and hot iron.











### EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS

1 4" Weave-It

1 2" Weave-It

4 2 oz. skeins white Botany Germantown

4 2 oz. skeins pale yellow Botany Gilgora

1 crochet hook, bone size 2

3 yds. ribbon



One of the sweetest outfits ever designed by Dorris Whiteside. Sweater, blanket, bonnet and booties simply blend into a combination you just couldn't beat. Worth five times what it would cost to Weave-It.

Blanket - Germantown Yarn

First weave 99 squares of white, and sew together, having the robe 9 squares wide and 11 squares long. Cross-stitch the bunny and kitty as shown in diagram with yellow Gilgora, the . and the ball of yarn in baby blue and the bow tie around the neck in blue — the o.

Edge: Fasten the yellow Gilgora in 1 corner, chain 2, \* 1 double crochet, in next scallop chain 4, 1 double crochet back in top of last double crochet (like picot) another double crochet in same loop as 1st double crochet, chain 2 and fasten in next scallop (middle of each loop) chain 2 and \* all way around afghan. Fasten off. Press well on wrong side with hot iron and damp cloth.

Baby Sweater - cap, booties of yellow Gilgora.

Weave 27 regular squares and 35 Jr. squares. Sweater: Assemble and sew together as shown in diagram. Sew fronts to back by x marks, leaving 1 square open in back and 2 Jrs. in front. Sew in a Jr. square under each arm diagonally. Sew up under arm seams. to .. Sew in sleeves v to v. Sew up under arm . to . seams. Fold back through dark line to shape the neck. Whip the surplus down on wrong side. Sew collar on. The 5 squares shape into the collar. Crochet around edge of sweater, collar and sleeves same as around blanket. Tie in front with ribbon and run ribbon through crochet around sleeves, draw up to fit and tie.

Cap: Assemble as shown in diagram. Fold back the turn back in front through dotted lines. The extra square is the back of cap. Fold back through dark line and tack down underneath. Sew the sq. into cap diagonally. Crochet edge as blanket across front. Around bottom edge single crochet in each scallop (just once) to gather into shape all way around bottom back and forth for 4 rows then crochet same edge as top of cap. Make small rosettes, sew on.

Booties: Assemble as shown in diagram, using 3 squares to each bootie. Sew the two squares as one. Whip all way around. Then take the other square and fold into triangle and whip the edges together. Sew x to x as marked (the triangle and two sqs. sewed together as one). Then the toe folds up and sews into the remaining part (a little triangle). Crochet the same edge around the top of bootie and run ribbon through the crochet for the tie.

# CROSS ROADS CARRIAGE ROBE

The addition of this bold and striking Cross Roads Weave has made this an unusually different robe. With white center and blue border, it's out of this world for taking junior out in the world.

# **EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS**

- 1 4" Weave-It
- 2 2 oz. skeins Botany Germantown in white
- 2 2 oz. skeins Botany Germantown in blue
- 1 crochet hook (bone) size 3

First weave 90 squares, 46 blue and 44 white in fancy weave Cross (see page 28). Sew together, making the carriage robe 9 squares wide and 10 squares long. Next, with the blue yarn, crochet the following edge: Fasten in second loop from one edge with \* 4


double crochets in next loop (all stitches go in middle of scallop, taking both loops together), single crochet in next scallop. Repeat from \* around carriage robe, fasten off. Press well on wrong side with damp cloth and hot iron.

# HEIRLOOM CARRIAGE ROBE

You'll want to hand down this robe from baby to baby, it's so unusual. It has the quality of an old masterpiece that had been worked on for weeks—yet you can WEAVE-IT in a few hours.

# **EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS**

1 4" Weave-It

4 2 oz. skeins, Botany Germantown White

1 bone crochet hook size 3

Small 1 oz. balls of baby blue, baby pink, baby green, medium green, medium blue in 203 ply yarn for cross-stitch

First weave 99 squares of the white and sew together, having the afghan 9 squares wide and 11 squares long.


Next, with the colors cross-stitch the designs shown in diagram, making 4 corner designs marked 1 cen-

ter marked C and 2 blue small sprays marked B and 2 pink small sprays marked P.

Edge: Single crochet in each loop all way around afghan, making 2 in same space at all corners. Fasten off.

2nd row: Starting in 3rd stitch from a corner work 1 single, \* skip 2 stitches, 1 double crochet in next stitch, chain 3, (slip stitch in first chain from hook). This forms a picot, 1 double crochet in same stitch, 1 picot, 1 double crochet in same stitch, 1 picot, 1 double crochet in same stitch, skip 2 stitches, 1 single crochet in next stitch. Repeat from \* around entire afghan. Fasten off.

Press well on wrong side with damp cloth and warm iron.






# LITTLE PRINCESS SET

Fit for a fairy princess—that's how it got its name. Completely feminine to the tiniest detail, it's a dream outfit for your dream girl.








# **EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS**

- 1 4" Weave-It
- 1 2" Weave It
- 1 2 oz. skein Botany Saxatone in baby pink
- 4 2 oz. skein Botany Germantown in baby pink Bone crochet hooks size 2 and 4
- 3 yds. ribbon

### SWEATER, CAP AND MITTENS

Weave 29 4" squares in Four Squares In One Design (see page 28), and weave 38 Jr. squares, 19 plain and 19 fancy, directions bottom of page 19 Sweater: Assemble and sew together as shown in diagram. Stitch fronts and back together, marked by . Sew on color and turn back fronts to fit. Sew the under arm pieces under arm . to . (diagonally) before sewing up seams of under arm sleeves and sweater. Sew in sleeves, then sew up the under arm seams. Fasten in one corner of sweater with slip stitch, crochet all way around collar and bottom and







sides, make a picot in this by chain 4, and fasten with a slip stitch \* 3 single crochets between each next 3 loops, picot, repeat around from \*. Crochet same around bottom of sleeves (going in middle of scallop) taking 2 loops together until just 8 picots appear. This makes the sleeve fit snug. Sew in 2 buttons and crochet loops to fasten in front.

Bonnet: Make 7 large blocks and 10 Jrs. Sew together as shown in diagram. Sew front to back as indicated by arrow. Crochet across front same as around edge of sweater. Across the back single crochet once in each scallop (2 loops together) all way across back for shape, and repeat the same edge. Sew on rosettes of ribbon.

Mittens: Make 4 large squares. Sew together as shown by diagram. Shape as shown by dotted lines (on inside). Single crochet around top edge. Next row, double crochet, chain 2, skip a stitch, double crochet all around top edge to form beading. Last edge picot as in sweater. Lace ribbon through for ties.

Afghan: Make 107 4" squares in Four Squares in One Design and sew together as shown in diagram.

Edge: Same as around sweater. Picot edge. Press on wrong side with damp cloth and warm iron.

### **FANCY WEAVE FOR JR. SQUARE**

1st Row: Weave plain

2nd Row: U3; O1; U3; O1; U3; O1; U3 3rd Row: W2; U3; O1; U3; O1; U3; W2

4th Row: Same as 2

5th Row: Same as 3 6th Row: Same as 2 7th Row: Same as 3 8th Row: Weave plain

# BYE BYE AFGHAN

Bye Bye bunting — daddy's gone a hunting. And you'd have to hunt high and low to find a niftier outfit to wrap your baby in, for naps or nightie-night.

# **EQUIPMENT** and **MATERIALS**

- 1 4" Weave-It
- 4 2 oz. skeins Botany Germantown in baby blue
- 1 2 oz. skeins Botany Germantown in baby pink
- 1 bone crochet hook, size 3 or 4


First weave 99 squares of blue and sew together, having the afghan 9 squares wide and 11 squares long. Next, with the color, work the correct design in each square as shown. There are 15 different designs and the small diagram shows the placing of the different patterns in assembling. These patterns are numbered 1, 2, 3, etc.

Edge: With the pink yarn, fasten in the corner, \* chain 6, fasten slip stitch 1/4 way across the block

(in middle of scallop) repeat from \* chain 6 and fasten in the corner of the next block when the space is reached.


Next row: With the dark tone, fasten in a slip stitch of last row, chain 3, 3 for picot, chain 3, and fasten in a slip stitch of last row. Repeat around.

Press the afghan on wrong side with damp cloth and rather hot iron.

# Little Boy Blue

Shoulderette, Cap Set and Carriage Cover

Your little boy will never be blue in this dashing outfit. And neither will you when you find out how easily and inexpensively you can Weave-It.

# **EQUIPMENT** and MATERIALS

- 1 4" Weave-It
- 4 2 oz. skeins Botany Germantown in baby blue
- 1 2 oz. skein Botany Saxatone in baby blue
- 1 crochet hook size 2 and 4
- 3 yds. ribbon in baby blue
- 1 pair bone knitting needles size 1

First weave 26 regular squares in fancy weave shown at bottom of page. Assemble squares for shoulderette and sew together as shown by diagram. With knitting needles pick up 38 stitches and knit 2 purl 2 for 2 inches. Bind off. Repeat for other end. Sew up to check V mark under each arm. Crocheted edge: fasten in a corner with slip stitch, chain 1 \* 4 double crochets (in middle of next scallop) (both loops together) chain 1, repeat from \* around. Fasten off. Turn back at dotted line on outside. Lace ribbon on and out for a tie.

Cap: Assemble cap squares as shown in diagram. Sew together where x are marked, making 4 on each side. Crochet same edge as in shoulderette across the front. Single crochet in middle of each loop across back (to gather in) then repeat the edge. Sew on ties. Press the set on wrong side with hot iron.

Afghan: Germantown yarn, size 4 crochet hook. Weave 99 squares in same design as the shoulderette

and cap. Sew together, having the carriage cover 9 squares wide and 11 squares long.

Edge: Crochet same edge as the shoulderette and cap. Press well on wrong side with hot iron.







# TWINKLE ROSE WRAP-A-BYE BLANKET





Tiny cross-stitched roses on a pink Pompadour background and satin ribbon finish, make the Twinkle Rose another star in the Weave-It firmament.

# **EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS**

1 4" Weave-It

4 2 oz. skeins Botany Germantown Pink Pompadour

4½ yds. blanket binding in pink or satin ribbon 1 spool mercerized pink thread Six strand floss — 2 pale pink, 2 medium pink, 3 pale green

First weave 99 squares of pink and sew together, having the robe 9 squares wide and 11 squares long. Cross stirch as indicated in diagram.

Then bind with satin ribbon or blanket binding. This should be an inch wide around afghan.

Press well on wrong side with warm iron.

# TWINKLE CARRIAGE ROBE

Crocheting the strips of yarn together, gives the Twinkle Robe a quality, open work look, usually found only in very expensive Carriage coverings.



# **EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS**

1 4" Weave-It

3 skeins (2 oz.) Botany Pompadour Germantown in baby blue

1 2 oz. skein Botany Saxatone in baby pink

1 crochet hook (bone) size 2 or 3

Weave 80 blue squares and sew together in strips 10 squares in a row and 8 rows. Then crochet around each strip with pink Saxatone as follows:

Fasten yarn to a scallop in the corner of a strip, 1 single crochet in same scallop \* chain 1, 2 s. crochets in next scallop of square, repeat from \* all way around each strip.


Then, whip the strips together with needle and yarn, catching through

both loops of s. crochet on each side and whip only through every other s. crochet from both sides.

Edge Fasten pink in a corner 1 s. stitch in same space, chain 1 \* 2 double crochets — picot — 2 double crochets — picot, chain 1 (all in same space) of chain 1 of last row 1 single crochet between next chain 1 of last row — chain 1, repeat from

\* around afghan.

Press on wrong side with damp cloth and hot iron.



Double lines in diagram indicate crochet joining.



# CRIB-A-GHAN

This lovely crib cover appeared in a former WEAVE-IT Book now discontinued. So many Weave-It fans have inquired about it, we have been forced to put it in this newest issue.

# **EQUIPMENT and MATERIALS**

1 4" Weave-It

10 oz. Baby Pink Germantown

1 oz. Baby Blue Germantown

1 Crochet Hook Size 4 or 5

First: Weave 99 Pink squares. Sew together in strips of eleven in a row, making nine strips wide.

Next: With the color work cross-stitch as shown in diagram, using center pattern beginning in fourth square from bottom and top and second square from sides. The dogs beginning in five squares, both from bottom and top edge. Cross-stitch the lambs beginning in second squares from each edge at bottom and top corners. Right lower corner repeated for left


corner at top edge, and left lower corner repeated for right corner at top edge. Press well on wrong side using a damp cloth and warm iron.

Edge: Single crochet (in loops) all the way around the edge of the afghan, making two stitches in the same space on all corners next row, \* two single crochets, chain one, (skip a space) two double crochets in the same space, chain one (skip a space) and repeat from \* around afghan.












# HOW TO WEAVE-IT FANCY WEAVES

The weaving instructions are by necessity, abbreviated, and your attention is directed to their interpretation: W (weave), U (under), O (over). You will find it easy to weave special designs if you follow directions.








# How to Sew and Assemble Weave-It Squares



1. Be sure you know the *right* side of the square. To determine the *right* side, hold square so that starting end is in lower left hand corner, finishing end in upper right hand corner. The side of the square facing you is the *right* side. (See figure 1.)



2. Place two squares together, right side to right side. The front square with the bottom edge up, the back square with the top edge up. (See figure 2.)

3. Line up the edges of the squares so that the double loops of the rear square appear between the loops of the front square.

The squares in this illustration were stretched to emphasize the path of the joining thread.

4. Thread the long finishing end and feed through the first loop of the front square, then through the first loop of the back square. Use an over and over stitch, two stitches to each pair of loops, all the way across the squares. (Figure 3 shows how thread goes through loops.) You'll find three loops at the extreme left of the square (caused from winding the Weave-It). Tie a slip knot when making last stitch. Do not draw yarn too tight when sewing squares together.

Yarn used for sewing two squares together may also

be used for sewing strips together.

# To Crochet or Knit Around Squares

When crocheting around squares take stitches only through the loops. In turning corners make two stitches in same loop.

When picking up stitches, be careful not to pull loops. Using a needle, take yarn from ball and pull a stitch through each loop. When stitches are all picked up, you may start knitting.

# GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

When making an afghan or garment, use the same interlocking sewing method and sew squares into strips.

Fill corners by making a stitch through the finishing off slip knots.

Bury loose ends by weaving them back an inch or

so on wrong side.

Split all four-ply yarns before finishing ends.

When using new or different color yarn for sewing squares together, weave in the loose ends left on the square and tie a slip knot before starting.


