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
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
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Materials.—Shaded crimson and white double Berlin wood; needles, No. S.

Wirn shaded crimson cast on two stitches. 1st row.—Make two and knit two together.

2d.—Make two and knit two together, let the other off; repeat this row fifty-seven times, and east off.

Take a loop in each hand and knit the centre rib tight; run a thread through one edge and fasten off to three-eighths of a yard in length.

Now knit another piece of sixty-seven rows, pull the loops out as before, run a thread through one edge, and tack this to the middle of the first piece you knitted, so arranging it that the edge of the first piece wherein the thread is run may remain for the neck.

With white, knit a piece of seventy-two rows; after having run a thread through one edge, tack it to the middle of the last crimson row. This has the appearance of three folds, one over the other, and when trimmed with a roll of ribbon round the neck, and a bow in front, it forms a very pretty and novel collar.
